OPERATIONS



108,527

Transfer Courses Processed

Between July 1 and September 30, UTO was actively involved in 108,527 courses transferred to IU. (Note that this is a decrease from the prior quarter, but May is historically the largest month.) This is an average of 1,193 transfer courses brought to IU every day, or the equivalent of 2,713 bachelor's degrees. Transfer courses serve to both shorten time-to-degree and increase student success.



8,801

Transfer-Active Student Records Processed

8,801 students brought transfer credit as they entered IU between July 1 and September 30, including both transfer students and new first-time undergrads. More than half of all new freshmen bring transfer credit, and approximately 20% (I in 5) of ALL undergraduates bring transfer credit to IU each year.



Articulation Processing

UTO has been working closely to transition the creation and maintenance of the course articulation rules from UTO to USSS. This will streamline the use of personnel and is scheduled for completion by the end of 2018.

Articulation Rules Created


Of the courses transferred this quarter, 7,944 resulted in the creation of a new rule. A new rule automates credit processing, therefore increasing efficiency for all students, but especially for transfer-active students.

New System to Process Credit and More

A unified Credit Transfer Service RFP was released on September 7. UTO is working in collaboration with the CTS Task Force and IU Purchasing in the assessment of the proposed solutions, including testing scenarios and system-level computing and data integration.



Associate Degrees in Liberal Studies as a Stop-Out Credential

A new associate degree is in the works for students who must stop out short of receiving a bachelor's degree. With the approval of the degree university wide, UTO is working with campuses on curriculum for a Fall 2019 availability.



Master Course Inventory

UTO, as an arm of University Academic Affairs, is currently engaged in an assessment of the university's Master Course Inventory. This includes assessments of course equivalencies, general education frameworks and intercampus coordination on mobility within IU.
